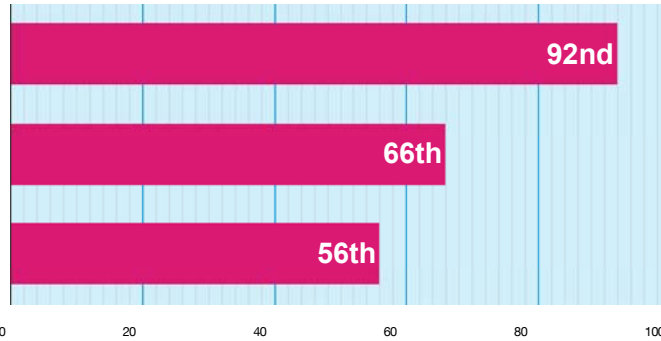

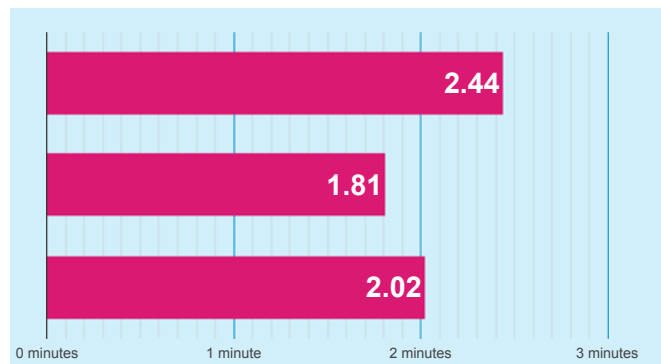

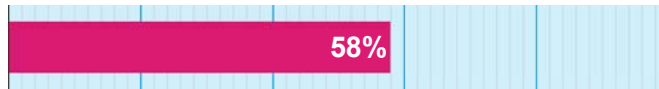

PERCENT OF QUESTIONS YOU ANSWERED CORRECTLY



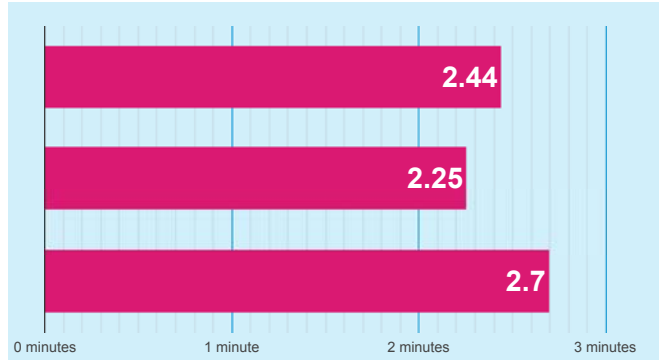

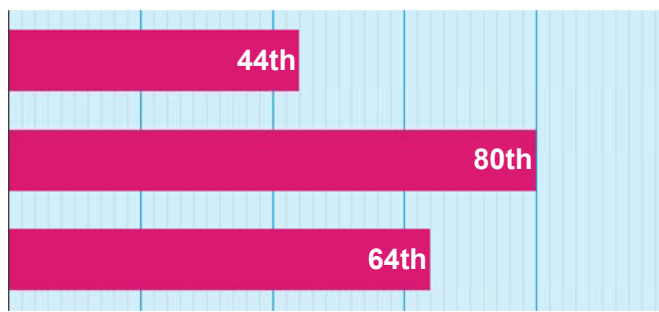
