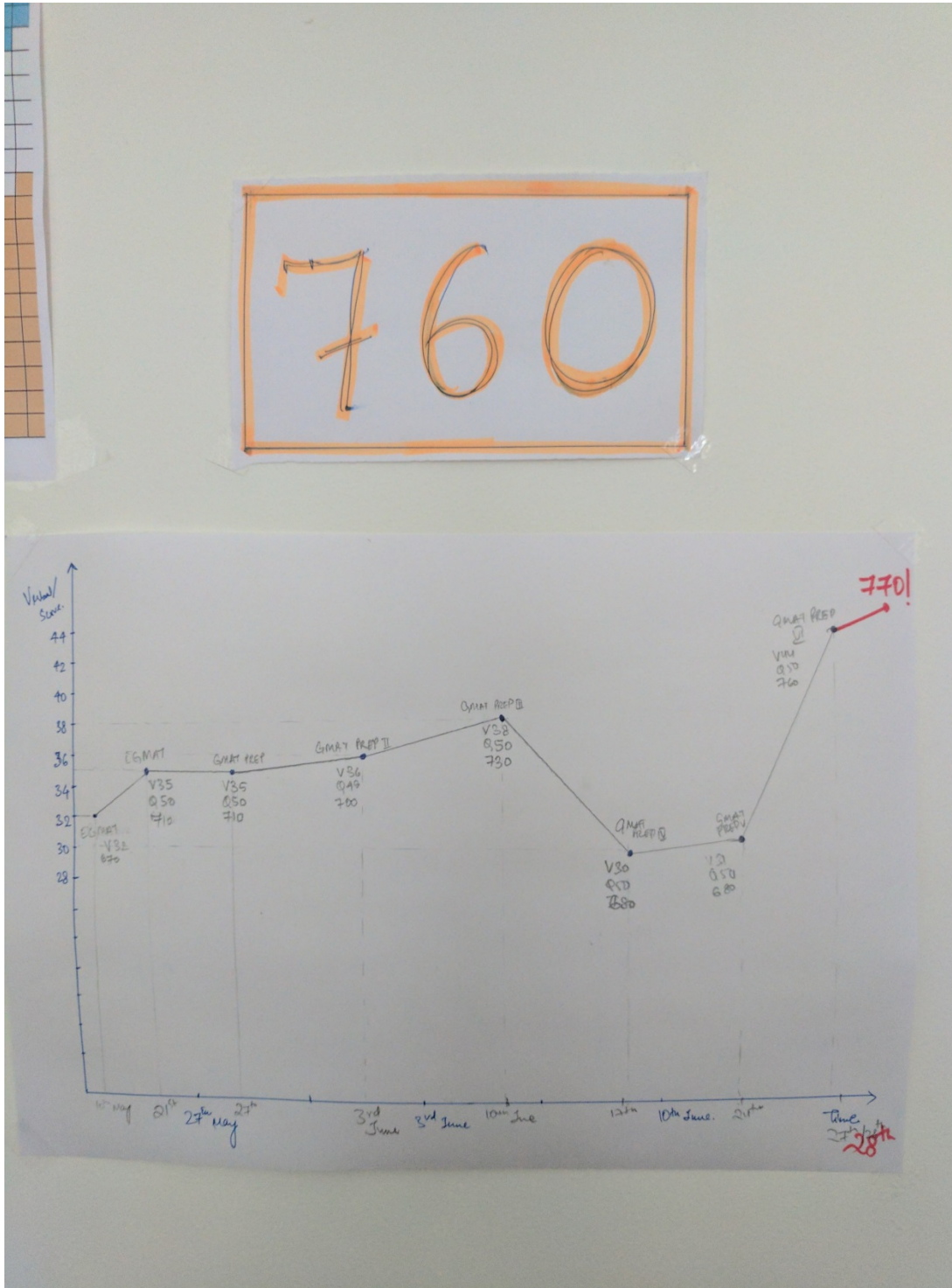

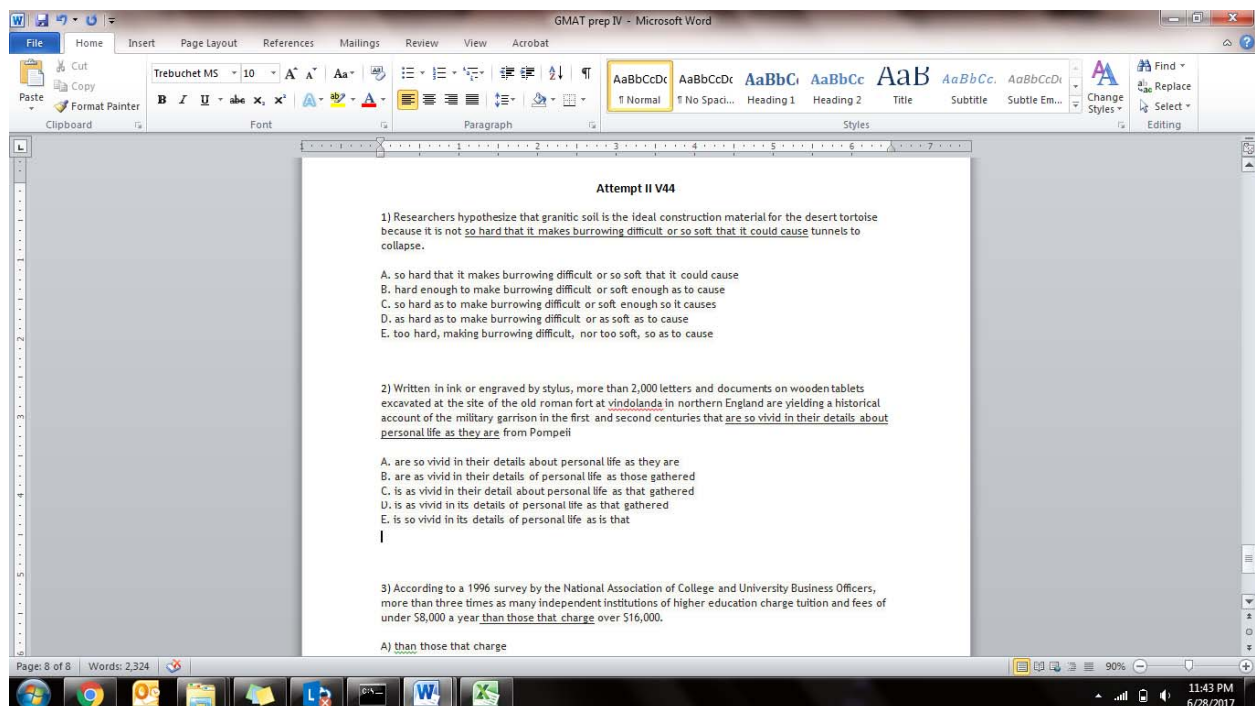

So this is one strategy that I devised and am proud of. So the first part of this strategy involves thoroughly revising mistakes. I used to take snapshots of the wrong questions, search them online and study their attempt. The second part of the strategy involves re-attempting the second test of each pack (eg: GMAT prep II for I&II; GMAT prep IV for III and IV). Because it was a re-attempt, I could see the higher difficulty level questions from each pack which benefitted.

Not only these handouts, when solved again, were helpful in revision later but also helped me understand my mistakes/ drawbacks better.
